- (3) Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Only PHA A PHA that administers more than 550 HCVs, was not designated as troubled in its most recent SEMAP assessment and does not own or manage public housing.
- (4) Standard PHA A PHA that owns or manages 250 or more public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550, and that was designated as a standard performer in the most recent PHAS or SEMAP assessments.
- (5) Troubled PHA A PHA that achieves an overall PHAS or SEMAP score of less than 60 percent.
- (6) Qualified PHA A PHA with 550 or fewer public housing dwelling units and/or housing choice vouchers combined and is not PHAS or SEMAP troubled.

1. Continue resolution of HUD findings and compliance with resolved items. – OIG Investigation completed with action taken by Attorney General's Office

Continue to cooperate with HUD officials to provide any information necessary to satisfactorily respond to their requests and resolve any outstanding issues. – MHA works closely with Field Officer and others to respond to the best of our ability on any issues HUD requests.

- 2. EPIC 5-year plan for facility improvements. MHA has completely finalized fund expenditures through 2022, Capital Fund 2022 budget and EPIC amendments made to comply with the 5- Year CFP Plan. Carry-over funds from 2023 are budgeted to be expended in 2024.
- 3. Apply 2023 Capital Fund Program monies toward highest priority items for maintaining quality housing standards at both apartment complexes. REAC Inspection was complete for 2023 with a score of 59. Since then, all of the deficiencies have been corrected and training for all MHA employees will be held November 17, 2023. Agency maintenance staff continuing routine maintenance and sometimes modernization required following tenant moveout such as cabinet replacements, flooring repair/replace, painting. Generally, all the 74 apartments are in very good condition.
- 4. Continue to increase Section 8 Voucher enrollments for Harrison County with a goal of 500 occupied units with not less than 75% of families admitted are below extremely low-income. -- Marshall has three affordable housing developers working on final approval of project funding for construction/renovations that will probably require Section 8 funding. The developers are expecting MHA support that could be provided through MHA Section 8 if funding is available. If Conversion of Public Housing to Section 8 Tenant-based housing is completed that will automatically increase enrollment by 74 vouchers. Considering Conversion of Public Housing vouchers and new developments approved, Marshall could easily reach the ACC amount of 651 tenants within the next three to five years.
- 5. Conversion of Public Housing to Section 8 vouchers plans now stand confirmed with a board decision allowing MHA Board of Commissioners approve the application for Conversion under the Section 22 Streamlined Voluntary Conversion program designating ownership of MHA Public Housing properties to the Marshall-Harrison County Public Facility Corporation to be operated under the MHA Section 8 Tenant-based Voucher program.
- 6. MHA Executive Director and Staff has already completed public hearings and coordination with City and County on planning to implement conversion. City of Marshall and MHA have agreed on the creation of the Public Facility Corporation that will undertake management of public housing operations with MHA continuing to administer the HCV program. The Public Facility Corporation will utilize funding realized from profits of tenant-based housing projects towards additional housing projects related to affordable housing for low-income persons. Public Facility Corporation was incorporated as the Marshall-Harrison County Public Facility Corporation on December 8, 2021, by the Secretary of State, State of Texas, under the State of Texas Local Government Code, Title 9, Chapter 303 Public Facility Corporations. It is a State-approved Tax-Exempt public entity under Title 9, IRS application for 501(c)(3) status submitted 11/28/2022 was approved 10/31/2023, effective date 12/8/21.
- 7. Enrollment policy changes have allowed implementation of:
- (i) The homeless individuals or families according to federal definition including families displaced by natural disaster, or families faced with eviction.
 - (ii) women victims of sexual violence, including women with children who are victims of family violence;
 - (iii) foster children who have turned 18 years of age without natural family care;
 - (iv) elderly persons over the age of 62 and disabled persons age 18 or older.
- ----Preferences approved and in effect 10/1/2021 and are in effect. Inter-agency agreements for supplemental services allowing support for the board approved preferential groups. East Texas Women's Shelter, East Texas Open Door Youth Shelter, and Twelve-way Foundation Treatment Center Tentative church coalition established to address local homeless services. -- Completed.
- 8. Initiate compliance with City of Marshall and Housing Authority of City of Marshall Memorandum of Understanding acknowledging and removal of any "payment in lieu of taxes" obligation on part of Housing Authority of the City of Marshall with accordingly HUD allocations and ACC contract amendment. Agreement has been reached with Financial Mgt Center personnel that PILOT can be used to pay monthly utility bills, increasing the amount of funds available when combined with Operating Fund utility expenses.
- 9. Agency-wide Environmental Assessment of each facility owned by Housing Authority was completed 8/7/2021 and is included with Conversion Application for 2023.
- 10. Conduct Public Hearings on Conversion with Tenants. -- Public hearing completed July 19, 2021. A second public hearing is scheduled for 2024 to finalize the transfer of property agreement.
- 11. Conduct Public Hearings on Conversion Plan. --- Public hearing completed July 19, 2021. A second public hearing is scheduled for 2024 to finalize the transfer of property agreement.
- 12. Application was submitted to HUD for Section 22 Streamlined Voluntary Conversion for Public Housing Facilities on September 13, 2023.

ADDED ACTIVITIES FOR 2024

Generally, all the items 1-12 listed above continue to be worked on for overall program performance and achieving goals. The following are new items listed for Activities in 2024.

- 1. To give support to new affordable housing projects in conjunction with City of Marshall's Community Development Department. Two projects are approved for development in Marshall. One is an 89-unit multi-family LIHTC apartment; the second apartment is a ground level duplex/four plex with 30 units. A third development is a new, single family modular home subdivision development of 25 homes in an affordable price range.
- 2. MHA will continue its efforts to qualify as a Housing Counseling agency and expand the Section 8 Homeownership Program. MHA plans to implement an inter-agency contractual agreement with the Northeast Habitat for Humanity to include Section 8 Homeownership for approved tenants to purchase newly completed Habitat for Humanity homes constructed in Harrison County.
- 3. Agency activities that will improve the Fair Housing program in cooperation with the City CDBG activities. MHA, M-HPFC, and Marshall Economic Development Corporation (MEDCO) will work with the City CDBG on an area-wide affordable and an Affirmative Action Fair Housing Plan.
